The Lion's Roar

John 12:20-21 "Now among those who went up to worship at the feast were some Greeks. So these came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus."

HOW DID THEY KNOW?

I have often wondered how those Greeks knew to go to Philip of Bethsaida. Did he have a sign around his neck saying "Jesus Tours every 1/2 hour?" I also wonder how people know to come to us. One of the things I want us to work on this year is becoming a more nurturing congregation. That is to say, we don't just invite people to hear the Word. We don't just act politely when they visit, but we treat them as though they were a tiny seedling trying to grow in a giant forest. That is to say that we work to discover their needs, spiritual, psychological and physical and we do all we can to meet all their needs knowing that if physical needs are not met, the other needs are not useful. In other words, if a person is homeless, sharing the love of Jesus with him without offering him a blanket and a dry place to sleep really doesn't do much for him.

BUT, before we ever get to meeting needs, how do we insure that we are people like Philip to whom people just know to come for help? First we set the example. Two equally damaging mistakes are often made by Christians. One is to say,

"Because I am Christian, I will not participate in anything worldly. While you have parties and go to concerts, I will stay home and study my Bible." I don't know about you, but there is not a regular flow of non-Christians through my living room. So if I stay in my house and read the Bible, how are those non-Christians going to find me? The other mistake is to say,

"Hey, I'm Christian but you will never know because I will be just as loud, drunk and debaucherous as the rest of you!" People don't like to be judged but people who are looking for a better life also want you to be an example of holiness. So while we are welcome to participate in all the celebrations of life, we need to remember that we have been set aside by the Lord. At your Baptism, you were made a child of God and that means that you are held to a higher standard. Philip was present, but Philip was clearly somehow different. Do you understand that the fact that you leave for church every week is a witness to your neighbors? The fact that you talk about your church is a witness to your neighbors. When you listen to someone's pain, invite them to worship, sit with them in church, take them out to lunch, offer to do whatever you can to help them in their need, you are witnessing your faith to your neighbors. But when you skip church, when you ignore a hurting person, when you do whatever you do to blend into the world so that no one notices that you are different, you are also witnessing — just not the way that you want.

It is a challenge to be like Philip. It means making sacrificial choices and not living for yourself but for others. It is rewarding though when that person, sometimes your own child or a member of your own family comes to you and says,

"We wish to see Jesus," and they came to you because they could tell from the way you nurtured them that you already knew him.

Music...

Amazing Grace

This hymn, written by a former slave trader, speaks of God's amazing love for us. John Newton spent the last years of his life as the pastor of a large church (St. Mary Woolnoth) in London. He prepared an inscription for the church building, which reads:

*John Newton, Clerk,
Once an infidel and libertine,
A servant of slaves in Africa,
Was, by the rich mercy of our Lord
And Saviour Jesus Christ,
Preserved, restored, pardoned,
And appointed to preach the Faith
He had long labored to destroy.*

John Newton was born in London on July 24, 1725, to a shipmaster and his wife, a devout Christian. She died when the boy was only seven, and he was sent away to boarding school for four years. At age 11, his father took him to sea, where he worked mostly on Mediterranean voyages. Newton joined the navy at age 17 and rose in rank to midshipman, but he overstayed a leave and was severely punished with flogging.

The young man took a ship to Africa and gained employment with a slave trader, who abused and half-starved him. At age 22, he escaped onto another ship, bound for London. Bored, with nothing to do, he began to read *The Imitation of Christ*, a book which later greatly influenced his faith life. Another influential experience on the ship was a strong storm, in which the entire side of the boat broke open. All aboard feared imminent death, but miraculously the ship's cargo of dyewood and beeswax kept it afloat. From that day forward (May 10, 1748), Newton marked the anniversary as the day of his conversion: "Thro' many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come; 'tis grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home."

Despite these experiences, Newton continued working in the slave trade for six more years, although he made sure that the slaves he transported were treated well. But this work became more and more distasteful to him, and in 1754 he gave it up. While working as a tidesurveyor at Liverpool, he came into contact with Christian scholars such as George Whitefield and John Wesley. Newton studied Greek and Hebrew, eventually entering seminary. He received his first pastorate as the curate (assistant pastor) of Olney in Buckinghamshire, but eventually settled in London at St. Mary Woolnoth. Under his leadership, the congregation grew to a large size, and he preached there until 1807, when he became blind; he died that same year on December 21. Newton's sermons against the slave trade influenced parishioners who later became instrumental in the movement to abolish slavery.

Besides "Amazing Grace," Newton wrote other well-known hymns, such as "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds" and "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken."

NATIONAL LWML CONVENTION 2011

More Than 4,600 Lutheran Women in Mission from across the nation gathered to conduct business, renew friendships, and rally around God's Word. President, Janice Wendorf, led the procession to open the 34th Biennial Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) which convened in Peoria, Illinois, on June 23-26, 2011. The convention theme was "Being with Jesus - Living on the Edge" based on the Scripture passage: And they realized they had been with Jesus. "For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:13b & 20 KNJV).

Rev. Dr. Ken Klaus, Lutheran Hour Speaker Emeritus was the proclaimer for the opening worship service. Just as Mary, Joanna, Mary Magdalene and Salome watched at the foot of the cross, tended Jesus' body and told the disciples of our Lord's resurrection, we should live on the edge with the message of the Savior. In this politically correct world, we are not supposed to speak the truth about Jesus as our Savior if it offends or makes others uncomfortable. Rev. Klaus reminded us, "You have the right to share your faith. And of even greater importance is this --You don't want to get in the way of the Holy Spirit!" Don't be afraid to ask the world, "What do you have to offer that is a better foundation than Christ?" And to the silence that must inevitably follow, extend the invitation, "Come join us as we live on the edge!"

Bible study leader, Rev. Dr. Reed Lessing explained how life-changing it is to be filled with the Spirit. It is God who fills us and when we are filled with the Spirit we must speak -- it is a divine mandate, a compelling command. What do we speak? What is the outflow of the Spirit? It is manifested in expressions of praise, thanks and encouragement to each other. He pointed out Barnabas was a great encourager in the book of Acts. "The LWML woman may not be able to be a Barnabas, but she can be a Barna-babe!" How do we become people who speak encouragement? Dr. Lessing offered three suggestions we can all take to heart: Stay in the Word, tell it like it will be, and demonstrate honesty and humility in all we do.

The 585 delegates adopted a new mission goal for the 2011-2013 biennium of \$1,825,000 (\$547,500 goes for operations/administration; \$1,277,500 designated for mission grants). Because we went over our last biennium goal by \$112,069, this amount will be added to the grant portion for a new grant mission goal of \$1,389,569 for the following approved grants:

The Mission Servants Committee reported that over 30,000 items were collected from attendees at the Convention. These "Gifts from the Heart" were donated to three local agencies in the Peoria area, as well as to Orphan Grain Train. The list includes: Quilts: 2,587; Bath Sets: 2,382; Underwear for men, women and children: 2,975; Children's Arch Books and Picture Bibles: 13,205; Health Kits for men, women and children: 5,587. "One of the greatest gifts was seeing the joyful reactions of the workers from the various ministries when they came on Saturday morning to pick up their items," reported committee members. "They all had to get bigger vehicles!" Lutheran Women in Mission all across the nation respond to God's love by making it a practice to share similar gifts in their own communities. Women of the LWML make known God's love by caring for the needs of others.
