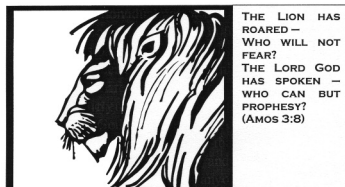

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## The Lion's Roar



THE LION HAS ROARED — WHO WILL NOT FEAR? THE LORD GOD HAS SPOKEN — WHO CAN BUT PROPHECY? (AMOS 3:8)

*Mat 25:40 ESV - And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'*

### Something Almost Everyone Can Give

You know the words from the Scripture above. Jesus was praising the righteous for feeding him, clothing him and visiting him. They all said, "when did we ever do that?" and Jesus answered that whatever we do for others, we do for him. We all have dreams of the things we will do someday for Jesus. We will give a million dollars to build a homeless shelter. We will become a volunteer and help rebuild the homes of flood victims. We will volunteer to teach children in Africa. But the reality is that most of us never have the time or the means to do the great works of which we dream.

Ovid, the Roman philosopher said,

"Dripping hollows out rock." That means that a single drip of water can do very little, but a few million single drops of water makes a difference. So while we may never be able to do anything amazing by ourselves, together we might be able change lives.

What can you do to make a difference? What gift can you bring that will change lives? BLOOD. At a recent staff meeting, I was shocked to hear how few people are giving blood at Trinity's regular blood drives. Only 20 people gave blood at our drives in 2011 and not all of those were members of Trinity. This is a small thing that we can do that makes a huge difference in the lives of people. "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me." Heartland blood center needs over 600 pints of blood a day to meet the need of the local hospitals they serve. A serious car accident uses about 50 pints alone. An organ transplant uses 100 pints and red blood cells only last 42 days so the supply must constantly be replenished.

This is something almost all of us can usually give. If you are 16 (with parental consent) and over 110 lbs, you are eligible to give blood. Of course I know that there are people who are ineligible because of certain medications they take or took or because they have colds at the time of the blood drive, but only 20 people in a whole year? And Danya and I were two of the 20, so there were only 18 other people who were willing to save a life with such a simple gift?

There are some who are afraid of the needle. I hate needles! But seriously, don't be ridiculous. We're talking about saving lives here folks and it hurts a lot less than a paper cut. Would you be willing to get a paper cut to save someone's life? When a little child dies because there was not enough blood, are you willing to tell her parents that you didn't give because you were afraid of the needle? Jesus suffered crucifixion for us. Is a little needle stick too much to do for another?

There are some who think they will wait to give when there is an emergency but that is too late. It takes at least 24 hours to process the blood you give so don't wait. Give now. And remember, your body replenishes every 56 days, so you can give six times a year.

Finally many assume that they are ineligible. Don't assume. Ask. Only a few people are permanently ineligible. It is estimated that less than 10% of eligible donor's give. So using that average, we could have 200 donors at Trinity in 2012. What an incredible gift of life to brothers and sisters we don't even know, but Christ knows them.

## SLEEP

*"When you lie down, you will not be afraid; when you lie down, your sleep will be sweet." Proverbs 3:24 NIV*

Sleep is essential to your well-being. It is necessary for the body to recharge its batteries, heal its wounds, rest the spirit, and regroup for another day. Everyone needs a slightly different amount of sleep but everyone needs good quality rest. This means deep, uninterrupted sleep for at least six or more hours a night. Without good sleep you will experience fatigue, moodiness, irritability, poor memory, decreased dexterity, decreased energy level, and possibly depression.

Many things can cause a poor night's sleep: excessive napping, physical ailments, poor sleep habits, excessive worrying, or even hormonal changes. Many of these conditions can be remedied through behavior change or medical treatment. If falling asleep is difficult, establish a routine to train the brain to prepare for sleep. If sleep problems occur more than three times in a week, consider seeing a doctor to determine if the problem might be medical in nature. Conditions like restless legs or hot flashes can be addressed medically. Continued sleeplessness and fatigue may cause additional risks for high blood pressure, cardio-vascular problems, weight gain, or depression.

Sleep is also impacted by the mattress you have. You spend approximately one third of your life in bed so make sure it supports you well and can give you a restful night. Consider looking for a new mattress if you routinely: wake up achy/numb/stiff, toss and turn during the night, sleep better on beds other than your own, feel yours is lumpy/sags or have a mattress between 5 and 7 years old.

Spiritually, sleep is important for active minds and good dispositions. The worries and challenges of daily lives often cause problems during the waking hours which can carry over into the nighttime. Turn your worries over to God. Work with His spiritual presence and His gift of medicine to achieve a restful night.

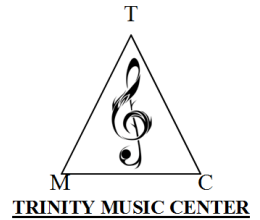
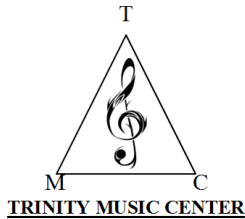

## YOUTH NEWS

A few weeks ago Pastor Rogers told the congregation about a trip that the 7th and 8th grade Confirmation class will take on March 2-4. They will be participating in a mission trip in Chicago that is sponsored by a national organization called Center for Student Missions, or CSM. Their mission statement is: "To provide an effective urban ministry experience that transforms lives, influences churches and communities, and honors Christ." Center for Student Missions provides mission opportunities for our youth to change lives by helping those less fortunate than they are. Helping those who are less fortunate will change the lives of our youth.

**For the analytical:** The cost of a weekend trip to Chicago through Center for Student Missions...

\$65 per night covers the cost of lodging, food, and staff who lead the trip

14 students and leaders will attend

\$1820 is the total group registration

A 15 passenger van is required for the trip. There is limited parking and the group must travel together.

\$240 is the cost of a 2 day van rental

\$35 for gas

**For the statistical:** Chicago houses nearly 3,000,000 residents over its 228.5 square miles (that's approximately 25 miles long by 15 miles wide). The greater Chicagoland area contains nearly 10,000,000 residents. Chicago's population is 27% Hispanic, 36% African-American, 33% Anglo-American, 4% Asian, and 1% other races.

The Chicagoland area is home to some of America's largest corporations, including Boeing, Motorola, United Airlines, Aon, Allstate, Kraft Foods, Walgreens, and McDonald's (including the Golden Arches' famous Hamburger University).

The Chicago public school system is one of the nation's poorest. There are over 400,000 students in the public school system and 84% of them live at or below the poverty line. 12,000 students attending school in Chicago are classified as homeless. For the students that start high school about 50% will graduate.

Chicago contains 16,500 public housing units for seniors and families across the city. In 2000 Chicago initiated the Plan for Transformation 2010 – the largest and most ambitious redevelopment effort of public housing in the history of the United States. They made a goal of getting rid of all the housing projects in Chicago by 2010. While there were many problems in the housing projects, demolishing them also destroyed a significant sense of community amongst residents. Even worse, the city of Chicago did not build new housing or provide nearly enough alternatives where families could move. Since so many of the housing projects housed families, the number of homeless families have skyrocketed in Chicago. In 2000 there were 4 homeless shelters that allowed families to sleep together. In 2010 there are now 14 shelters that provide for in-tact families. There are over 60,000 households on the waiting list to get Section 8 housing vouchers in Chicago.

The number one cause of homelessness in Chicago is lack of affordable housing. Chicago is tearing down over 22,000 public housing units and replacing them with only 7,500 units. The average rent for a 2-bedroom apartment is \$1,736 a month. A person would need to work over 52 hours per week at a minimum wage job in order to only pay the rent of an apartment at that cost.

Women with children comprise 34% of Chicago's homeless population. Most often, they're fleeing domestic violence they suffered in their former residences.

**For the practical:** There are great things about Chicago, yet there are many problems lying just below the surface. The obstacles that many Chicagoans face are economic, racial, physical, emotional and spiritual. Despite all these issues, there are social service agencies, churches, and individuals who spread hope that a better day is yet to come.

Organizations such as Center for Student Missions really make a change in Chicago and 9 other cities across America.

CSM provides:

A City Host that organizes the logistics of the trip and helps the group process the experience.

Housing in the heart of Chicago where the group will experience firsthand the sights, sounds, smells, and textures of urban life.

Meals at local, family owned ethnic restaurants.

An opportunity to learn about the city they are serving through a van "prayer tour" of various neighborhoods.

Ways to become part of the solution by plugging the group into hands-on experiences at various indigenous ministry sites.

### For the tender-hearted

CSM provides their participants:

A chance to change personal relationships with Christ by giving the opportunity to be Jesus' hands and feet in a hurting world.

A chance to change back at home. Youth return to their home community with new eyes — sensitized by seeing first-hand the ethnic diversity and pockets of poverty they'd never noticed before. They'll have a new vision for how faith can impact home life and community at large.

A chance to change their future. Many young people and adults have returned from a CSM trip and changed their school major, job, and/or career plans.

Quotes from the youth who participated in last year's CSM trip:

*"The mission trip we took really opened my eyes. When we were at the soup kitchen it was very heartbreaking to hear all the stories of how they got where they are now or their past. There was a boy there that wasn't much older than me and all the other 8th graders. Also a woman whose been living at the shelter for a long time because her husband lives with her kids somewhere else. It really gives some perspective and lets me know that I have many people surrounding me that love me dearly. If there was a trip to go to the shelter again I would definitely go!"* – Abbey

*"The mission trip we went on was an eye opening experience because it showed me what life was like in the city. It also showed us what people from the shelter go through on a day to day basis. We learned a lot from giving out meals to the homeless. We also cleaned out a housing unit for the homeless."* – Tom

*"The trip was a great experience. I enjoyed going to the soup kitchen and learning about peoples' stories. I liked being able to offer help to people who need it and are truly grateful. My favorite part was going through Chicago. It let me see my many blessings and realize that not everyone lives in such a safe place as me. I loved it!"* – Molly.

The youth board has made a commitment to the families of these youths to cover the cost of this trip. If you would like to support the CSM trip in Chicago, you can send donations to the church office or put an envelope marked "CSM" in the offering plate. The youth are also collecting socks and travel sized hygiene products for the homeless.

### Lutheran Service Book (LSB) Part IX: Acknowledgments

Like other printed material, the contents of our hymnal are covered by copyright law. Reproductions of text or music are allowed only with permission of the copyright owner. If the copyright on text or music has expired, however, then it is considered to be "in the public domain" and therefore freely available for reproduction.

A new feature of LSB is the inclusion of copyright information on the hymn page itself, rather than in an index. A look at the bottom margins of Hymns 628-31 is instructive:

Of these four hymns, only #628 is immediately available for reproduction as it appears in the hymnal (text, tune, and setting). The music and text of #631 are reproducible only if the melody is used, not the setting (alto, tenor, and bass parts). The tune of #630 can be printed, but the text requires the permission of the copyright owner, while for #629 nothing is available without permission.

A partial list of copyright owners and administrators is provided in LSB on p. 992. Corrections and changes to this list can be found on the website of the hymnal's publisher: [www.cph.org](http://www.cph.org).

Trinity subscribes to the copyright service "OneLicense," which allows us to pay one yearly fee for copyright permissions from many publishers. The fee is based on the size of our congregation (for Trinity, approximately \$300), and allows us to reprint music for the congregation. Choral and instrumental music is not included. Single-use licenses (for one song) usually cost between \$25 and \$60, which makes OneLicense very cost effective. When we use OneLicense for a song or hymn, Trinity's license number is included in the acknowledgements at the end of the bulletin.
